RPD and their crime prevention officers (CPOs) are no longer providing printed crime reports to the community from the Monroe County Crime Analysis Center as they had done in the past. However, they will continue the reviewing of criminal activity at their monthly PCIC meetings. Since July 22nd, the City and RPD have converted all reporting of recent City crime data to the internet site of www.CrimeReports.com .

The site is available 24/7 and is updated frequently by RPD with the data on recent significant crimes from throughout the city. There is expected to be a several days time lag during this process. Upon reaching the site, enter an address and the crime map of the surrounding area will appear. It will also show beyond the local crime, the location of sex offenders per the national registration database. Selecting an icon will provide the detail information of the incident.

IS YOUR FIRE EXTINGUISHER UP TO DATE?

I recently attended a meeting where a representative from the Rochester Fire Department presented. He mentioned that fire extinguishers should be inspected annually. When I arrived home, I was dismayed to discover the expiration date on our extinguisher was 1987! I took the extinguisher to Monroe Extinguisher Company at 107 Dodge St. They were very helpful and provided the information for this article:

Fire extinguishers need to be inspected annually. You can find a check list of things to look for at www. fire-extinguisher101.com. Monroe will provide an inspection for \$5. Every 6 years the extinguisher should under go a hydrostatic (pressure) test, be discharged and recharged by a certified distributor. The fee depends on the size and type but it is in the \$45.00 range. Recharge extinguishers immediately after use regardless of how much was used. If your extinguisher is older than 1984, it is obsolete and should be replaced. For residential use, an ABC or BC extinguisher is recommended.

Remember: If the fire is bigger than your extinguisher, call 911 immediately.

BNA OR NWV-WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?

New and long time homeowners often ask which association their street belongs in and what is the difference. Merchants and people from other areas of the city often wonder as well.

Browncroft does get email inquires from city residents on nearby streets and we do give them referrals to the right city department for assistance. Our list serv, the BNA-Announce, is a public list serv and anyone may register for it.

Browncroft started in 1973 and handles issues directly relating to the quality of life of 18 strictly residential streets: Elmcroft Road, Elm Drive, Berwick Road, Lanark Crescent, Monticello, Merchants Road, Quentin Road, Browncroft Boulevard, Corwin, Windemere, Dorchester, Newcastle, Croydon, Yarmouth, and Beresford Roads, Ramsey and Gramercy Parks, and Gaslight Lane. We have a representative from each street who reports concerns to the board. In addition to our website (Facebook and Twitter accounts as well), we produce a newsletter, the Browncroft Crier, that goes to all 672 homes. We hold social events, an annual meeting, educational programs twice a year, and our biannual neighborhood wide garage sale.

North Winton Village covers a much larger area. It goes from CulverRoad east to Winton Road, the Irondequoit line south to University Avenue. North Winton Village deals more with the merchants, economic development and commercial districtbeautification. NWV has an office (the Safety Center) on East Main Street. They hold many well attended informational meetings and have an arts festival in late September and a Holiday Festival along Winton Road in December.

They are two different organizations that may work together on zoning issues that effect BNA neighbors directly, or such major concerns as the spring 2011 campaign to save our neighborhood library. BNA does

MEDICARE PLAN SELECTION TIME CHANGES

This year the dates for selecting/ changing ones Medicare supplement are earlier than in the past. The selection period begins October 15 -- that's a Saturday so really it is Monday the 17th -- and ends December 7. It's important to be aware of the earlier end date.

NEW YORK STATE TAX CREDITS FOR HISTORIC PROPERTIES

The New York State tax credits that took effect January 1, 2011, for qualifying home improvement costs to historic properties for projects that contribute to the preservation of the historic integrity of a property listed on the National Register of Historic Places (or is a contributing property in a listed historic district), now potentially apply to all properties within the Browncroft Historic District, based on the new census. Prior to the new federal census, only half of the BHD fell within an income eligible census tract, as reported in the January 2011 Crier.

This credit will cover 20% of qualified rehabilitation costs of structures, up to a credit value of

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workmen mentioned. There is no shelter planned. I will work on getting the sidewalk extended from the last house on Browncroft to the bus stop.

The Winton Road construction project (Browncroft to Blossom) has been postponed to 2015 due to lack of federal funding.

We are looking for street reps on Merchants and Gaslight Lane. I have been looking for someone on Gaslight to write an article about the history of their street. We are also looking for hospitality help, gardeners, and a co-chair for the Gazebo Garden committee.

I would like to encourage everyone to volunteer in some way, register on our website for our emails about events and major announcements, send in the \$5 dues if you can, and meet your neighbors! Also, mark your calendars for the annual post-holiday party at Glendoveers on Friday, January 20, 2012! \$50,000.00 providing the project has qualifying rehabilitation costs that exceed \$5000; spend at least 5% of the total on exterior work; and receive preliminary approval from SHPO staff.
