Surprise New Temp Building Coming to School 46 – Neighbors Respond to RCSD: STOP – We Need to Talk.



Early in the week of June 25, neighbors observed small “H” frames being placed in the School 46 field next to the existing remote classroom building along Newcastle Road. Upon inquiring into what was happening, a neighbor was informed that a portable classroom building was going to be moved from School 50 and placed adjacent to the existing building. The neighborhood had not been informed of this action previously. The work crew was in the process of marking the spots for the portable’s foundation footers. The new

building was to be approximately the same size and would be connected by a 15-20 yard wooden deck. It had not been included in discussions on the summer renovation work that was presented to the BNA.

Within days, a letter was sent to City Hall and the Rochester City School District (RCSD) officials by a neighbor reflecting the strong negative feelings of neighbors. This letter asked that the project cease, since this would be the third “temp” building on the grounds and would be even more remote from the main academic building. The placement and boxy wooden building style is seen as greatly impacting both the valuable open green space and the historic look and feel of the character of the Browncroft neighborhood, especially as viewed alongside the exceptional architecture of the 1933 main building.

Other neighbors have joined to challenge the RCSD. The BNA has been requested to support the neighborhood's concern and Aaron Thompson, BNA President, is now a participant in getting to the bottom of RCSD plans. The Mayor and City Zoning have been contacted but have deferred to RCSD all resolution as no permits are required or needed by RCSD activities. RCSD Facilities, the RCSD Board President and Superintendent have been contacted. Follow ups are underway. At this time, several meetings are planned but no further information is available.

This is a fluid situation at this moment and updates will be available over the short time on Nextdoor Browncroft for those who live in Browncroft and have registered. (You can see details on Nextdoor.com at www.browncroftna.org/nextdoor). Summaries may be made available on BNA-announce and Facebook as they are warranted. The next CRIER, delivered to all households in late summer, will provide a progress update.

Tennis Court at 46 School Playground In Derelict Condition – Neighbors Want It Fixed

Jim Bishop of Gramercy Park has brought the unsightly, and unusable, tennis court on the southern boundary of the 46 School playground to the attention of the Browncroft Neighborhood Association Board of Directors. A meeting was held on Saturday, June 16, at 12:30 at the tennis court. In attendance were: Jim Bishop of Gramercy Park, Ivan Lennon-- Beresford, Joe & Lucy Nunn and Mike Sisson from Windemere, Nathan Pesgen, Ed Hochroiter, and Bob Genthner of Newcastle.



Topics discussed were the ongoing (over 15 years) derelict

condition, the worn out unsafe playing surface

with cracks, crevices, and weeds. The athletic backstops (4) are rusty, broken, jagged edged and weed or vine covered. It is an accident waiting to happen, as well as unsightly!! The playground surface is also in poor condition -- uneven, rutted and in dire need of a new safe playing surface. There are some schools in the city that have beautiful rubber safe surfaces.



What message does this send to the neighbors, BNA, and visitors to the area? Is this the example that RCSD sends to the school population regarding being a responsible and respectful neighbor?
