A Little Bit of History ...

Gaslight Lane - Tract Development 1967 to 1973 - A neighbor's recollection

The street was simply a city owned vacant lot, with access off of Blossom as it is today. The "field" as it was called extended all the way to Dorchester. After the fire in the gym of School 46 in 1963, the city used part of the land for reconstruction. The gym was enlarged, an Eastern wing built and the playground, parking lot and athletic fields were developed. The cement wall west of the rear basketball court is a vestige of the divider between former vacant land and school property. This actually extended north, behind the gym, to just short of the outbuilding. A chain link fence was installed at the Southern border of the school property, existing today.

The house at #1 Gaslight Lane stands on the northern part of the backyard of 1238 Blossom Road. In the mid-70's this Brighton parcel was sold and the home constructed.

Prior to the 1968 construction of #3 Gaslight Lane, the city owned lot was a dumping ground for sidewalk slabs the DPW had replaced around the eastside. Due to the haphazard array, the area was a playground in itself for the neighborhood kids. Many a fort was dug in and around this area, and of course, if a new washer or refrigerator was delivered nearby the packaging box soon was incorporated in any plan.

Where #53 and #54 now exist, a row of 5 to 6 cherry trees stood, perpendicular to the current roadway. An old, decrepit oak stood approxcontinued on page 6

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SUMMER LAWN CARE

While many are desirous of maintaining a lawn which would do Oak Hill proud, the reality of lawn care, particularly in a mature, treed environment such as Browncroft, is a daunting task.

Instead, you may choose to have a lawn which involves less mowing, fertilization and watering. The cardinal rule when you mow is to avoid scalping the lawn, especially during hot spells. Instead, mow at a higher setting as this will place less stress on the grass, inhibit weed growth and require only spot watering in areas which show evidence of stress. Admittedly, your lawn after mowing will not look like the Frontier Field outfield. On the positive side, it will not "brown out".

By using a mulching mower, you will find that you need to fertilize less frequently.

When re-seeding, plant clover along with regular seed as it serves as a natural fertilizer. Organic fertilizers, including milorganite, are also best for the soil and are benign to organisms, including worms. Consider buying worms to add to the garden and lawn.

In the fall, compost at least some of your leaves which can later be used in your vegetable bed or when reseeding the lawn.

NEIGHBORS SIGNING ON TO NEW WEB SOCIAL NETWORK - "NEXTDOOR.COM"

Have you heard about Nextdoor.com, the new social network website launched nationwide on October 25, 2011 and designed for and about welcoming neighborhoods? There are now over 1,000 neighborhoods in 48 states residing at Nextdoor.com.

The "BROWNCROFT" neighborhood site on nextdoor. com was created two days later using the established BNA borders. Unlike Facebook.com, it is restricted in membership exclusively to the household addresses within a given neighborhood. All members of a household address can sign up individually. It is free and your page is protected by a password and encrypted by HTTPS.

As of February 18th this year, there were 52 households registered with 59 members. There are no "screen names" used – real names only. It's secure and is completely safe and respects your privacy. It makes it safe for you to share things with your neighbors that you would be okay sharing with them in person or "over the back fence".

Nextdoor Browncroft is not searchable by Internet search engines. There is presently no advertising on the site. It has features for member profiles, neighbor chat, directory, household mapping, "buy/sell/free", event planning, resources, photos, and recommendations. It's simple and easy to use and the site developers indicate that more features are coming soon!

Browncroft addresses are verified by Nextdoor.com through mail, phone option, or a direct

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STREET LIGHTS UPDATE

Thanks to the many Browncroft residents who gave of their time and expertise over 28 years at various meetings at the Petsos, Genthner, and Lennon homes and the Winton Library, discussing the intricacies of lumens, wattage, post top fixtures, poles and costs.

Also, others, including Joe Nunn, Linda Siple, Jim Bishop, Marilyn Schutte, Kathy Flynn, Laura Viau and Kay Melnyk. This group canvassed, for a second time, door-to-door to secure overwhelming neighborhood support for this long-standing initiative.

We have reached agreement on the traditional pole with the historically correct fluting topped by a globe as originally erected some ninety years ago when the tract was built.

Councilwoman Elaine Spaull, Commissioner Paul Holahan and Ned Kelley have been most patient and supportive in bringing this project to its current stage with an impending request for bonding authority to City Council.

The CRIER will keep you posted as to future developments, which affect the street light circuit that included Quentin Road and streets south of Browncroft Boulevard (except Gaslight Lane). These streets originally petitioned in 1984 to reject the city's plans to install their generic fiberglass pole system. Their goal was to either retain their historic concrete pole streetlights, or to get them back to rectify an earlier replacement program.

imately where #53 Gaslight is now. These were most likely the plantings on the prior orchard acreage and were the only items left on the plot of land. The cherry trees were great to climb and led to many a sore stomach when the fruit came into season.

In late 1967 Asta Developers bought the land and construction began. As the street access was in Brighton, sewers, water and streetlight lines came in off of Newcastle. They ran behind the tennis courts and made a 90 degree turn, south, near the fence gate, ending at the Southern most end of the new road. The gate was installed between #111 and #116 to allow kids to get to 46 without a long walk around. The city did not want to allow the easement for a sidewalk and the land was simply split between the 2 homes, with the gate forever locked closed.

While bulldozing the topsoil away, a deep gouge in the land was formed, roughly where #71, #77 and #85 are now. With heavy fall rains, this area would flood and the result was a skating rink for the kids. This existed for some 4 years until the aforementioned homes were constructed in 1971.

When word of this new street got out, the city zoning hearings drew the interest of a group of nuns from the Mercy Motherhouse. The road needed a name and they proposed honoring a former Priest who had worked in the area hundreds of years ago. Hence Father Priedeaux was honored with the original street name of Priedeaux Park.

Homes at #3, #15, #22, #29 and #38 were the first to be built and occupied. The two homes flanking the cul-de-sac went up next. In late 1968 and 1969 there were neither 911, nor computer aided dispatching for emergency services and actually each agency had its own 7 digit phone number and to convey a proper spelling of the Priedeaux street name became impossible. Compounding possible emergencies, the post office, pizza deliverymen and almost every store that delivered could never get it right. In light of this, a small group of neighbors requested of the city that a change be made; a simplification if you will.

At this time a huge Rochester Gas and Electric gas storage tank still existed across Blossom Road from the street. Also considered was the style of "gaslight looking" streetlights as we still have today. In light of all this, Gaslight Lane was born.

Due to the economy even in the late 60's the original developer pulled out and it was months for a second contractor to begin again. He built numbers #8 and #21 and more on the cul-de-sac, before he went bankrupt. Finally a third developer entered the picture to complete the homes in the middle, with final construction done in the early Seventies, completing the street as it is today.
