Our partnership with Jewish Family Service brings us a new opportunity for neighborhood elders and their families.

So here from Janet Sunkin, CEO of JFS, is the good news.

"Solutions are just a phone call away. Residents of BNA who have questions about programs and services that will help them remain safe and independent at home can call the Jewish Family Service (JFS) Aging Services Program at 461-0110.

A case manager with expertise in aging at home will speak with the caller and typically will follow-up the call with a home visit. The case manager will assess the needs of the client and make suggestions about services and programs that can be helpful.

If the client agrees, the case manager will arrange, coordinate and monitor a package of services that can include items such as home maintenance, house keeping services, meals, transportation and connection with social opportunities. The primary goal of case management is to optimize the client's independence, safety and

Your Browncroft- Home For A Lifetime committee is planning a Fall 2010 launch of transportation services for Browncroft residents. Partnering with Lifespan's "Give A Lift", a consortium of volunteer driving programs, and Sister Ann, Program Coordinator, we are creating a program to provide rides to our neighbors who do not drive or who are temporarily unable to drive. With the help of Browncroft volunteers we hope to be able to transport those needing rides for medical appointments and necessary errands.

Currently we are looking for neighbors who are interested in exploring the possibility of becoming a volunteer driver. As a driver, the schedule is very flexible and you can drive as often or as little as you would like. If this service warms your volunteer heart, it will warm ours. Contact Joan Dwyer at 288-2813 to let her know of your interest and availability. In the event Joan cannot be reached, feel free to contact Ann D. Weintraub at 482-8662. If we have enough volunteer drivers we will schedule a training in September.

As part of this partnership, Lifespan's "Give a Lift" program will provide registration, screening and thorough training. In addition, they will provide supplemental liability insurance while you are driving. At a fall meeting, date to be announced, there will be a presentation of the details of the Browncroft volunteer driving program.

We are seeking a volunteer to coordinate and schedule the rides. We anticipate that the job will take a few hours of your time each week. We will provide you with a cell phone and you can coordinate the program at home on your schedule. If you would like to learn more about

STREET WATCH ON QUENTIN ROAD

A tree fell on my neighbor's garage roof last winter while he was vacationing in Texas. I called his cell phone to tell him about it. He told me that the neighbor on the other side had already called and e-mailed him a photograph of the damage! What if my house had a fire while I was gone? How could someone contact me? Quentin Rd. homeowners have the solution. We all have a spreadsheet with six pieces of information for each home: street number, name, phone, e-mail, children at home/ birth year and alternate contact (a relative, or cell phone number). It

all fits on one sheet of paper, and is simple to update. We used birth year rather than age, so updating is simpler: "Olivia 07, Aidan 09." The two residents who did not have e-mail were given a print-out of the list. Residents were told to put the list in a safe place, not the refrigerator, so a burglar would not have a handy list. We asked permission before printing the information; it was given to homeowners only. If we happen to see people loading a truck in the middle of the night, we will call the homeowner's number. 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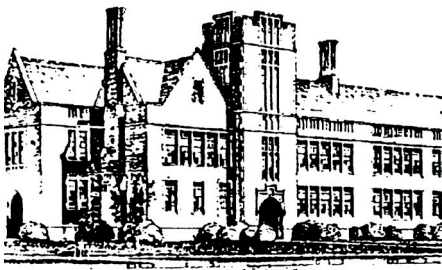

A LITTLE BIT OF HISTORY

— (From the Citizen-Advertiser
Auburn, N.Y., Tuesday, April 25,
1963)

Headlines: “*Elementary
School 46 Damaged by Fire*”

“*ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP)*

— *An elementary school was damaged extensively early today by a \$100,000 fire officials said had been set.*

Flames were confined to a combination gymnasium-auditorium of Elementary School No. 46, on Newcastle Road, but several classrooms suffered smoke and water damage.

No one was injured.

Dr. Robert L. Springer, superintendent of schools, estimated the damage. He said the school would be opened Friday.

Fire officials said evidence indicated that someone had broken into the two-story, brick building and set fire to papers and curtains in the auditorium.

The school has about 400 students.”

As a result of that fire the auditorium was rebuilt and enlarged and a new wing was added to the building, thereby creating the new kindergarten, cafeteria area, and back parking lot. This wing extended into the then recently acquired lot east of the building. (Reference the last Crier issue regarding that lot.) Bob Genthner

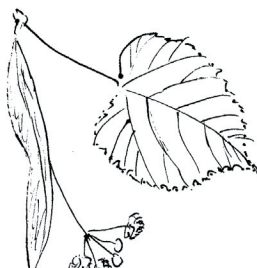
AH - WHAT'S THAT AROMA?

To this writer summer isn't summer until the linden trees blossom and the neighborhood is enveloped in their wonderful scent.

They can be European linden that are often planted as street trees, or our American basswood that can be found as huge mature trees in yards, possibly a legacy from our nursery history.

The Latin name is *tilia*. They both produce flowers that fill the air with a jasmine-like scent, and make a wonderful tea that is much loved by most European cultures and by bees that produce excellent tasting honey from them.

The Browncroft neighborhood is not only cool and beautiful in summer. It smells good, too. Enjoy.
