Historic Browncroft Street Marker Fabrication Project

The BNA has formed a committee to look into securing a grant to fabricate ten more Browncroft street markers for the historic district (Corwin and Croydon districts). They are seeking a \$35,000 grant.

The street markers are the cast-iron obelisk-shaped markers and were the original street sign posts in the neighborhood. They were on every corner but over the years many were removed during war-time to melt down the iron or some were damaged beyond repair. Now, only four remain: at Corwin/ Ramsey, Newcastle/Windemere, Beresford/Blossom and Dorchester/ Gramercy.

The grant will pay for one of the existing markers to be shipped to a foundry that specializes in landmark restoration where they will make a mold and replicate

Speeding, Noise and Motorcycles

Three tough words when put together. Recently there have been emails on NextDoor.com regarding traffic noise on Browncroft Boulevard that reaches Corwin Road residences that back up to it. These are quality of life issues that I have brought to the attention of the RPD at several of the safety meetings held biweekly by NWVNA with Officers Cannon and Belliard and with our Commander Lloyd Cuyler at PCIC.

As a first step our crime prevention officers have gone out and spoken to all the bar owners in the area, asking for their cooperation. The officers requested that the owners speak with their bars' ten markers. The markers will be shipped back to Rochester where a fabricator will ready the markers to be installed. The BNA is working with the City of Rochester to have

the new markers installed. The grant will require an approximate 10% in-kind donation (\$3,500) from the BNA and neighbors. A fund raiser will be undertaken later this summer and fall.

The following is a report from the Construction Project Manager Samuel Priem, P.E. via email on June 28th:

"The City contractor (Keeler Construction) is behind schedule due to unforeseen additional underground work, replacement of some water main down Humboldt St. and some storm laterals.

It looks like removal of the existing pavement will begin roughly in two weeks beginning from Blossom to Humboldt Street. They will replace the old road base with new crushed stone base. Aldi Development Lawsuit Update

As reported previously a Supreme Court case was pending in which Rochester Eastside Residents For Appropriate Development (RERAD) and IGATOPSFY LLC (Tops) were suing the City of Rochester and Aldi over the proposed development of an Aldi store near the northwest corner of Winton and Blossom Roads which the Rochester Zoning Board of Appeals had granted variances to allow, and for which the Planning Commission had given site plan approval.

State Supreme Court Judge Thomas Stander ruled on April 28, 2016 that RERAD lacked standing to sue as the residents would not suffer any harm by the development greater than that of the general public, leaving IGATOPSFY

LLC as the petitioner. The judge ruled against them in that, in his opinion, the Rochester Zoning Board of Appeals and the Planning Commission did not act in an arbitrary

or capricious manner, or with an abuse of discretion in regards to the granting of the approvals. The case was dismissed by the judge and his judgment of dismissal was filed and entered on May 24th.

Since the decision and order of the judge, the plaintiffs filed a Notice of Appeal on June 14th and will have 60 days to perfect the appeal by submitting their brief of record.

Go Green.

Suggestion from the Storm-water Coalition of Monroe County -

Many of the downspouts on our neighborhood homes are connected to the storm-water system. Unfortunately, this arrangement can contribute to flooding downstream and impact water quality.

If your downspouts are connected to a clay pipe that goes into the ground, then the runoff from your roof is going into the storm-water system. Monroe County suggests that you disconnect the downspout and redirect the water into a rain barrel, rain garden, or using a flexible elbow joint, redirect the water away from your house out into a flat lawn area.

Taking this action will reduce the amount of water that enters the stormwater system. However, before you do this give careful consideration to local building codes and how the runoff will be managed so it does not result in standing water or impact adjacent homes. Runoff should be conveyed at least 10 feet from foun-
