Over the past year BNA has continued to perform its role in looking out for the neighborhood and the community at large. Board Meetings continued on schedule using a hybrid in-person and Zoom format in order to allow as many Board members as possible to be able to attend. However, we have had no in- person events where neighbors could have gathered to socialize, attend a lecture, or have a garage sale, as covid rates have been erratic, even after vaccinations became available in spring of 2021. Neighborhood health and safety. defined in the broadest sense, has been governing the Board's decision making.

However, BNA has not been inactive. Beautification work in the Rose Garden, Books for School #46, a Food Drive to benefit the community through Foodlink, updating the BNA Constitution and Bylaws, ongoing interaction with other neighborhood associations and the City of Rochester concerning the zoning code alignment/amendment, sponsoring of an architectural Zoom lecture, and STEM kit donations to School #46 have kept the association Board and volunteers busy.

The number of residents paying their membership dues was at the same level as in past years, as was the generous added donations that came in with the membership applications. Therefore, we thank all of our residents who are members and hope that when the 2022-2023 membership drive starts in June or July BNA can count on you to renew, and that more residents will join your ranks.

It seems the general public has opened up for business now, so BNA is going to hold an in-person Annual Membership Meeting. It is an important meeting our residents need to attend.

The Mayor of the City of Rochester, Malik Evans, will be our guest speaker. Additionally, the election of new officers and voting on the proposed amendments to the Constitution (See article explaining the changes.) will require a good attendance by the membership, in particular.

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BNA AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

The BNA Board has been discussing amendments to the Constitution and Bylaws for approximately three years for the purpose of clarifying that the neighborhood association's boundaries extend into Brighton on Corwin, Windemere, and Dorchester, which inspired the creation of a graphically improved map for "Exhibit A". Membership dues were changed many years ago, but were not updated in the Bylaws. Also, since our Bylaws were drafted BNA has obtained liability insurance and officers and directors insurance to fortify the section that stated they were not personally liable. Electronic meeting procedure is another update for the times.

Amending the Constitution requires a 2/3 affirmative vote by at least 20% of the membership after being proposed by the Board of Directors, which is why this measure is on the Annual Meeting Agenda. Paid members will have received their copy before the meeting. Voting in person at the Annual Meeting or by mail-in vote (proxy) will be allowed.

The Bylaws can be amended by the Board of Directors and this was done by resolution at the April 12, 2022 meeting.

Below is a summary of the proposed changes for the Constitution and the amendments made to the Bylaws. The documents will be posted on the BNA website. Currently, they are separated until the proposed amended Constitution is passed.

Constitution:

Article I, Section 2.
Purpose and boundary definition

to add a reference to the Town of Brighton and "as shown the map in Exhibit A"

2. Article VII, Section 3. Board members must affirm their intention to remain – not at the Annual Meeting- but at the 1st board meeting thereafter.

ByLaws:

3. Article I, Section 1. Membership is open to residents only of the neighborhood. This has been the practice.

4. Article II, Section 1. Membership dues are updated to \$10, which is what they have been for many years, and a section was added (section 4) to give the Board the authority to change them as needed or appropriate, rather than requiring a cumbersome full amendment of the By-Laws every time.

5. Article III, Sections 1, 2, 3, and 4. Meeting notice advances were simplified from "7 to 15" to just say "a minimum of 7".

6. Article III, Section 3. If members petition (15 names required) for a special membership meeting, it has been added that BNA would send a notice to the membership of the meeting, as BNA has that ability, not the petitioners.

7. Article III, section 5 was added to account for electronic notices and virtual meetings, which were not available in 1985, the last time the Bylaws were amended.

8. Article V, "Duties of Officers and Street Reps" – a Section 7 was added to provide the Board with the power to remove an officer or street rep for failure to perform duties or for actions that undermine the BNA mission.

9. Article VII, Section 3. The Budget and Finance Committee responsibilities section was simplified to represent the procedures actually practiced.

10. Article VII, Section 4. External committee correspondence, position statements or news releases previously only needed approval by the President. It was added "and by the Board or Executive Committee".

11. Article VII, Section 6. Officers and Directors Liability insurance added.

ARCHITECTUAL LECTURE ON LEANDER MCCORD PRESENTATION

On March 31st BNA, with the assistance of the Landmark Society, was

pleased to organize a virtual lecture on Leander McCord,

"Rochester's Architect of the Roaring Twenties" It was presented on Zoom by Christopher Brandt, Project Architect at Bero Architecture. BNA publicized the event via BNA Announce and Browncroft Nextdoor.

Chris shared examples of McCord's exten-

sive work in our region of public, commercial and residential buildings including some two-dozen

homes in Browncroft. The examples shown varied in architectural style and size. His lecture was packed with information that history and architecture enthusiasts found very enjoyable. Chris has given this lecture to another group

in person at the Rochester Public Library, but he tailored it some-



what for Browncroft.

In order to attend Browncroft residents and other interested architecture buffs had to register through the Landmark Society's website, and were emailed the Zoom link and

passcode. Due to the tight scheduling between newsletters, everyone was made aware of the virtual

event via BNA Announce, and it was posted on Nextdoor, as well. One of the advantages of viewing the lecture electronically was

being close up to the slides. Fifty nine people of the ninety nine who registered tuned in. Approximately



thirty were Browncroft residents. Thank you to the Landmark Society of Western New York, and specifically Caitlin

Meives, Director of Preservation, for their help in hosting and registering participants for the Zoom platform.

IS OUR TREE LEGACY VANISHING?

There are many neighborhoods in Rochester that, like Browncroft, were developed on subdivided nursery grounds at the turn of the 20th century and earlier. However, it was Browncroft that took the planned subdivision one step further. Though there are singular streets in Rochester with landscaped malls, only Brown Brothers Nursery planned and planted a detailed landscape comprised of shade trees, ornamental trees and shrubs on 10 streets when they developed the Browncroft Subdivision in 1914 to create a 300 acre park-like setting for home lots.

This information is not new to many of you, but it warrants repeating for our newer homeowners to bring awareness to the beauty and comfort the Browncroft trees have provided to residents for over 100 years. And in this time of rising temperatures, polluted urban air, and urban noise we need our trees more than ever before.

This is a clarion call. The neighborhood canopy is in a steep decline. It is obvious to residents who have, until recent years, been able to walk under a solid green, cool leafy bower. Perhaps newer residents can imagine the once unbroken canopy and the majesty of the mature trees and join in the work to preserve what remains, and become dedicated to planting new trees back into the historic land-

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BNA SUPPORTS "STEM" AT SCHOOL 46 -

Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics

BNA has had a long-standing involvement with our local School 46, located at the corner of Dorchester and Newcastle. At the start of each school year, new students are gifted



books. Additionally, this year BNA gave support to the after-school science club by providing STEM kits, and bringing in people to work with the students.

The initial set of kits were gifted personally to the school by Jim Davis. Jim is our BNA secretary, and an electrical and optical engineer. He worked, with the students on "Circuit Blox", which are lego-like blocks that can be assembled into electrical circuits. The students, with some assistance. built the first 10 experiments, and some students even went off script and created new and novel circuits with the set of blocks. On the last day of the program for the 2021-2022 school year, Dr. Chen Ding, a computer science professor from the University of Rochester attended the session and worked with the students to explain computers and how they are used to further science.

BNA has committed additional funding and purchased the following STEM kits for next years class.

• Playz Extreme Kids Chemistry Set - for kids Age 8-12 with 52+ experiments & 51+ tools (4 sets).

• Crystal Science Kit for Kids - for ages 8-14, arts & krafts kits - (2 sets)

• NATIONAL GEOGRAPHIC Rocks & Fossils Kit – 200+ piece set includes geodes, real fossils, rose quartz, jasper, aventurine and more rocks, crystals and gemstones (2 sets)

• AmScope 120X-1200X 52 Peice Kids Beginner Microscope STEM Kit with metal body microscope, plastic slides, LED light (2 sets)

BNA is happy to have provided kits that support electrical engineering, chemistry, geology, and biology, and appreciate the opportunity that Dr. DiTullio the principal of school 46 provided to support the neighborhood and Rochester City School students. Special thanks to Marianne Dennis, the teacher who volunteered her time in the after school science program and helped BNA to get Jim Davis and Dr. Chen involved. Thanks to Dr. Chen for sharing his time and expertise.
